	Greece having some of the highest prevalence rates globally. A significant
	concern is its distribution, which is based on socioeconomic and
	demographic factors. Recent data showed higher rates in rural and low-
	income areas, as well as among vulnerable populations with limited access to healthcare and health promotion services, such as Roma and migrant
	children. Despite national and European initiatives to prevent childhood
	obesity, there is limited evidence on the effectiveness of the regulatory and
	operational framework, particularly for vulnerable groups in Greece.
	<b>Aim:</b> This study aims to analyze and assess the national regulatory and
	operational framework addressing obesity in children in need and identify
	determinants influencing its implementation and effectiveness.
	Methodology & Sample: This is a cross-sectional qualitative study, using
	individual interviews and focus groups based on semi-structured guides.
	The sample includes parents of children with disabilities, caregivers of
	children living in care centers, Roma community leaders, and policy
	implementers from the health, social protection, food, and education
	sectors. Additionally, a structured literature review of the existing national
	regulatory and operational framework will be conducted.
	<b>Contribution:</b> The expected findings could support policy development, at
	both local and national level, by offering evidence for the implementation
	of targeted interventions to tackle the problem of obesity. Furthermore, the
	study is expected to provide new insights into current legislation, strategies,
	and actions in Greece related to childhood obesity in vulnerable
Varmonda	populations.
